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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

V.R.A.L.Rajkiya Mahila Mahavidyalaya, Bareilly was established on July 1st, 1996 by the State Government of Uttar Pradesh as a milestone in the sphere of women education in Bareilly city. Since its inception the college has been dedicated to the herculean task of the expansion of higher education among the girl- students of Bareilly. As the college is situated in the heart of the city, it provides an easy access to higher education. With the commitment to impart quality education to the most deprived section of Indian society i.e. women, the college- the first of its kind in the city- continues to grow even in the face of odds, challenges and obstacles. With every passing year it credited itself- offering undergraduate courses in three faculties- Arts, Science and Commerce, postgraduate courses in four subjects of Arts- Home Science, Political Science, Sociology & Music and then, stepping on to the new horizons with distance education through U.P. Rajarshi Tandon Open University, Allahabad.

The college has a total land area of 5.415 acres and the constructed area is 0.050564 acres. The college has sufficient number of Lecture Rooms, Labs, Girls Common Room, Reading Room, Playground, an open stage for performances, a library with required books on all the related subjects, computer room etc. The college has been approved under section 2 (f) and 12 (B) by the University Grants Commission, Govt. of India. Presently more than 3000 students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/MINORITY/ GEN communities as well as differently abled students are being benefitted with quality education in the college. The college has qualified teaching and non- teaching staff. All the teachers are appointed by the UPPSC according to the norms laid down by the University Grants Commission. The eco- friendly and

green campus of the college is laid with different kinds of beautiful flowers. The beauty and cleanliness of the campus evinces the incessant efforts of the eco restoration club as well as the services done by the NSS volunteers.

Affiliated to M.J.P.Rohilkhand University, Bareilly (U.P.) the college is committed to impart quality education to the girl students of the surrounding area at minimal economic cost through optimal utilization of available resources. The curriculum is designed by the Board of Studies in different subjects at the University level. As the members of the Board of Studies, the teachers of the college contribute significantly to the curriculum design. The college offers limited flexibility in the choice of subjects as per University norms. The university revises the syllabus at certain intervals in order to make the curriculum relevant to the current scenario.

Admission process in the college is transparent and strictly follows the norms laid down by the State Government as well as the University. Merit based admission system is implemented on the basis of the marks obtained in the last qualifying exams. The college publishes information through Prospectus with the application form which is made available to the aspirants in the college office. The information is also circulated through local newspapers and college website. The detailed information about the admission process is displayed on the college notice board.

There is a healthy teaching learning atmosphere in the college. The academic calendar is formed at the outset of the academic session. Then, the time table of all the faculties is formed. Teachers plan their teaching schedules according to the time- table. During the academic session the knowledge of the students is enhanced through teachinglearning process. Besides this, the extension lectures, study tours, visits to the other organizations, participation in workshops and seminars, internal assessments through class tests, discussions, quiz etc. are arranged at intervals in order to enrich the curriculum. In order to guide students for career- oriented studies, the Career Counselling and Placement Cell of the college organizes counselling sessions with distinguished counsellors. The college collaborates with Career Counselling Cell of MJPRU, Bareilly, KCMT and other institutions for career counselling programmes.

Apart from academic activities extra- curricular activities and extension activities are also organised at the college. To make the student competent for the present competitive world the college also organizes inter- degree colleges competitions. The college also organizes Annual Sports & Youth Festival UMANG to chisel the hidden talents of the students. During the youth festival competitions like Poetry-Writing, Essay- Writing, Story- Writing, Matki Decoration, Best out of Waste, Rangoli Making, Natak Competition, Dance Competition, Classical and Folk Songs Competition, Cooking Competition, Jumps, Throws and Athletics are organised to embellish the extra- curricular talents of the students. The Rangers unit of the college and Ranger Leader Dr. Rekha Kulshreshtha have been awarded with the prestigious Vice-President Award, Neeraj Yadav of B.A. II has won state yoga championship, NSS volunteer Rahmeen Shaikh of B.Com III has been selected for Republic Day Parade 2016, Priyanka Mishra of M.A. music has been selected for performance through visual media. The students of the college also participate in university sports and other events held at different institutions and secure places there, too. Moreover, programmes are organized on important days like Hindi Divas, Literacy Week, Human Rights Day, Women Day, International Food Day, Teachers Day, Aids Day, Traffic Awareness Week, National Youth Week etc. The students are also made competent for the use of computers through Computer Training and Computer Literacy.

The college also does its best for community service through community outreach programmes organised by the NSS & Rangers Units, Eco Restoration Club, Women Cell and Legal Literacy Cell etc. Different units of the college collaborate with other organisations of private and public sector like District Hospital, IVRI, Career Counselling Cell of MJPRU, Bareilly, Rotary Club, SAKAR and JAGAR NGO, Distt. Skill Development Centre etc. for extension activities and community service. With the help of these organisations Medical Check-up Camps, workshops, awareness rallies etc, are organised for the purpose.

The examinations are conducted according to the plan published by the affiliating university. The college conducts quality exams with the outcome that the result of the college is almost hundred percent in different courses. Moreover, students enhance the glory of the college by securing positions at the university level. Manjari Mishra, Neeti Mahor, Monika Chandra of Music Department Shraddha Suyal and Vineeta Rathore of Home Science Dept have qualified at the NET exam of the UGC and Sonal of B.Sc. (Bio) is selected for M.B.B.S. A host of students pursue the goal of higher education while many are employed in different fields. Apart from the university exams the college also co-operates in organizing different competitive exams of state and national level like B.Ed Entrance, Bank Recruitment, BSF, IAS and NDA etc.

Valuable attempts are made to maintain a favourable atmosphere for quality research in the college. Dr. Sandhya Rani, (Associate Prof. Music), honoured with State Shikshak Shree Award, has supervised around 26 research scholars and a few are still working under her guidance. Research work is also being conducted in other departments. A major research project in English, Minor research projects in Music and Mathematics have recently been completed. Besides, all the faculty members participate in various workshops and seminars along with contributing research article to journals of national and international significance. IQAC and Research Committee support the research activities in the college. The college library has rich research section and reference books to support the teaching learning process and research aptitude of the students as well as faculty.Research aptitude is inculcated into the students by motivating them to carry on project work, surveys and analytical studies. The college magazine *Avantika* is published to encourage students for creative and analytical writing.

The Proctorial Board of the college takes special pains to maintain discipline in the campus. Grievance Redressal Cell os committed to solve the problems of the students and attend their complaints positively. All these are used efficiently in teaching learning process. Computer training is organized at the college under computer literacy programme. The Govt. U.P. distributed laptops to the Under-graduates in the year 2010. The meritorious students of 12th (studying in our college in graduation first year) are given laptops by the state govt.

<u>Computerized Administrative Work:</u> The admission process is fully computerized. The Fee details are maintained through computer. The scholarship data and examination system is also fully computerized. Internal arrangements and outsourcing is done for carrying on the computerized work.

Sharing Administrative Responsibilities: The college shares the administrative responsibilities entrusted to the Head of the institution by the Govt. of U.P.. The Principal and faculty of the college are often appointed Inquiry Officer by the State Govt. and District Administration to conduct inquiries related to scholarship and appointment in other institutions. The principal of the college was appointed as the Nodal Officer to U.P. State Govt. for organizing Cleanliness Programme of the Govt. of India on Hand Washing Day in 2014-15. The Principal was appointed Nodal Officer to conduct survey for New Education Policy of India at Blocks, Local Bodies and District levels. In lieu with this, the Nodal Officer made a detailed schedule and entrusted the staff to conduct meetings and surveys in different areas to prepare and upload reports as per instructions. The faculty are also appointed expert of Selection Committees. Dr. Dileep Kapoor, Asso. Prof. of Physical Education, has worked as the Astt. Director, Dept. of Higher Education, U.P.

<u>Website:</u> to meet the requirement of the contemporary world the college has launched its website <u>www.ggpgc.org.</u> All the relevant and important information of the college are available on the website.

<u>Feedback Mechanism:</u> The feedback mechanism is developed through Alumni Association, student's feedback and communication with parents and other stakeholders. The Grievance Redressal Cell and Proctorial Board establish liaison between students and college administration.

<u>Teacher Student Interaction:</u> Besides formal teaching the students interact with teachers informally on different matters related to institutions. They can meet the principal without prior permission.

Empowering women for securing equal access to resources such as education, employment opportunities beyond unpaid reproductive work, political participation, health facilities, shelter and nutrition, land and entrepreneurship and the rest is the need of the day. An equal access to resources would be materialized through de-marginalizing and de- hegemonizing women, providing them safe transportation and secured existence inside and outside home. Women's odyssey to assert their rights to define and determine development policies and reclaim their control over resources is to be steered with a new momentum that may cope with the speed of the world today. The need of the hour is to encode the glass ceiling that still exists and smash it urgently.

Hence, the academic and extension activities are planned keeping in view the global mission of gender equality with focus on the codification of women's legal, civil and other rights as human beings. Extension lectures are organised by the Women Cell of the college every year on issues related to women like their legal rights and their place in the society, today. Legal Expert Mrs. Harinder Kaur, Academician, Dr. Purnima Anil and Social Worker and State Mnister Mrs. Sadhna Mishra have been invited guests to give voice to the women issues in the college and strengthen students to face the challenges. The political Science Dept. organises events related to human rights on the Human Rights Day. On this occasion the rights of women as a human being are frequently discussed. Dr, Vandana Sharma, Dr. Mithlesh Mishra, Dr. Pradeep Kumar of JAGAR NGO have been often invited to discuss with students the subjects of women rights. Miss Nitika Pant of SAKAR NGO made the students participate in the debate on women issues through innovative methods like story-telling and article analysis during the NSS Camps and Human Rights Day. Legal Literacy Cell of the college organised a workshop on the legal rights of women with the co-operation of District Legal Literacy Cell. Police Ki Pathshala was organised in the current session with the collaboration of Amar Ujala Foundation and District Administration to aware women on the issues of safety. The college also supported the Beti Bachao Campaign of Amar Ujala and Save Girl Child Campaign of Dainik Jagran, Daily Newspapers. Besides these, during the NSS camps women of different fields and those associated with social work are invited to address the issues of empowerment and awareness. Mrs. Mandeep Kaur, Programme Executive of AIR, Bareilly, Mrs. Beena Mathur and Mrs. Richa Tandon- the entrepreneurs and skilful managers, Miss Priva Dutta and Nitika Pantworking for social awareness, Mrs. Vibha Pande, Drama artist of AIR, Rampur, Dr. Malini Kulshreshtha and Dr. Rashmi Sharma- well- known medical practitioners of Bareilly have been invited during NSS camps to motivate and guide the students on various issues. Extension lectures are also organised on the issues of women health and cleanliness. In 2014-15 Dr. Neelu Purwar of the district hospital lectured on the subject. Thus attempts are being made continuously to shell off the stereotyped attitudes towards women with a strong commitment to empower women to change the world- a mission if not attained would leave all other U N goalspeace, security, sustainable development- stand in jeopardy.
